Treasurer:

Balance on hand as of February 28, 2014 was \$19,825.09. Carol reviewed the finances with the NE OL committee. Carol sent out 110 letters and invoices to law enforcement agencies, short line railroads, etc. requesting funding donations for NE Operation Lifesaver. There has been a very good response using the letter campaign for donations.

Pat Leahy is the Western Nebraska Area Coordinator. He continues to do presentations.

Old Business:

Hunter Visor Card – Carol Daley/Tom Hillyard

The Hunter/Fisherman Key Safety Tip Visor Cards are still in the works. NE OL will provide the visor cards to students taking the Nebraska Firearm Hunter Education Classroom Course. These should be available by the May NE OL meeting.

Update for new presenter training – Carol Daley

The new Operation Lifesaver Authorized Volunteer (OLAV) presenter training has about 60 people who have applied to take the training. There are 35 to 45 presenters that have taken the online training. This training needs to be completed first before the presenters are ready for the face-to-face training. Carol completed the pilot class on January 25, 2014 at the Harriman Dispatch Center. There will be a face-to-face training after the meeting today with the committee presenters. Carol will set up training in Omaha, Lincoln, Gering, North Platte (April) and Grand Island. The training in Lincoln will be held on March 24 at News Link.

Gretna Schools – Deb Ashworth

Deb Ashworth has met with the principal of the Gretna School District on setting up an OL Blitz with the 4 elementary schools. The focus will be on the 1^{st} through 4^{th} grade students which would target 1,100 students. The Union Pacific LEAD volunteers will help with the presentations at the schools.

Fundraiser Update – Carol Daley

The 2013 NE OL raffle provided another \$4,799.00. There will be more discussion on this year's fundraising event at the next meeting.

New Business:

See Tracks? Think Train – National Safety Campaign – October/November

"See Tracks? Think Train!" is a campaign designed to run at a national and local level throughout 2014. The national umbrella campaign consists of television and radio PSAs; billboard and poster materials covering trespassing, transit safety and grade crossing safety; and a mini-website (SeeTracksThinkTrain.org) that will host the PSAs and toolkit materials that NE OL and our volunteers can use throughout the campaign. OLI will also develop and provide starter kits of campaign materials and merchandise for each state program.

Each region will receive \$25,000 which will be divided between the five states, of which NE OL will receive \$5,000 for this project. The campaign will run during the months of October and November for our region. NE OL will be looking into billboards as a possibility or it may be some 5 second PSAs. A suggestion was made to purchase hunter/fisher license pocket billfold with the message on the cover. Clip art in different sizes for the newspapers to use the message as fillers is also an option. Carol would like to see the "See Tracks? Think Train!" placed on the ticker tape at the Department of Motor Vehicle sites.

2014 Operation Lifesaver Leadership Conference – Carol Daley

Carol and Deb Ashworth will be attending the 2014 Operation Lifesaver Leadership Conference, May 14-15, 2014, Albuquerque, New Mexico. The conference is for state program leaders, presenters and partners. The theme of this event for rail safety advocates is "See Tracks? Think Train!"

Projects:

NE OL Trailer – Deb Ashworth/Dan Chapp

Deb Ashworth gave an update on the new OL trailer. The console has been painted and is being completed by the Council Bluffs Mechanical Department. As soon as the console is completed, cabinets, carpet, ramps, awning will be installed, ceiling will be painted and then the trailer will be ready for the outside design. A locomotive seat also needs to be found for the trailer. Dan Chapp has been getting estimations for the cost of

the wrap. The cost will be higher if the rivets are pulled out and replaced. The final decision will be a wrap on the outside of the NE OL trailer with a universal OL message. The visual on the side of the trailer needs to draw people inside. We will also need to find a cover and a place to store the trailer. Open Discussion:

Tom Hillyard will be contacting every propane carrier in his area to provide information in regards to propane trucks and railroad crossings. The recent motor vehicle (propane truck)/highway-rail grade crossing fatality has made this a priority issue with the Union Pacific Railroad. He has made 19 contacts and 7 presentations since the crash.

Abe Ahshasi discussed the cost of Quiet Zones which can run up to \$200,000 to more than \$500,000. The cities which requested this option have to come up with most of the funding and bear the expense of hiring a consultant.

Pat Leahy reported the Union Pacific will be placing the "Report Problem or Emergency" call/location plaques on both sides of the post on the railroad crossing signs. There should be yield signs at all the railroad crossing by 2015 He contacted the DMV to see if this information can be placed in the State Driver's Manual. He was told this would not happen until the manual is reprinted.

OPERATION LIFESAVER, INC. STATISTICS WORKSHEET January – December – 2013

- 1. Most collisions occur with trains traveling under **30** mph. (Visual 4)
- 2. Approximately **64%** of all collisions occur in daylight hours. (Visual 4)
- 3. Most collisions occur within **25** miles of the driver's home. (Visual 4)
- 4. Approximately every **3 hours** (some place in the United States) a collisions occurs between a train and a vehicle or a train and a pedestrian. (Visual 4)
- 5. You are **20** times more likely to die in a collision with a train than in a collision involving another motor vehicle. (Visual 4)
- 6. At 55 mph, it may take a train up to a **mile** or more to stop. (Visual 7)
- 7. Nearly **50%** of all collisions occur at crossings equipped with active warning devices. (Visual 15)
- 8. Nearly **25%** of all collisions occur when the vehicle runs into the side of the train. (Visual 22)
